## **LEADERSHIP CORNER** Sage Advice for the Fruitful Leader

# Leaders share success with the team.

"Alone we can do so little; together we can do so much." (Helen Keller)

Why do some leaders succeed where others fail? It is often because they understand that success is a team effort. Leadership and teamwork go hand in glove. One is fully dependent on the other. Leaders have learned the valued principle of partnership, and they are always ready to team with someone who can contribute to a shared goal. The pooling of increased wisdom and ability affords a greater opportunity for excellence.

Efficiency generally increases with participation. Great leaders create an atmosphere in which others can succeed also. They're not afraid to allow their associates to take responsibility, and they're willing to give credit when they excel. When success comes, leaders celebrate a team victory!

## Leaders acknowledge the potential of others.

"Treat people as if they were what they ought to be, and you may help them to become what they are capable of being." (Johann Wolfgang von Goethe)

Humans are the vast untapped resource of the planet. Wise leaders are those who mine that potential. They see what's good in others and bring it to the surface. Leaders see the potential of their associates. They are always more concerned with what someone *will be*, than with what he or she currently is. others as later abilities. As a potter holds the unformed clay and envisions its later excellence, a leader sees his or her associates' weaknesses as future strengths, and their questions as future wisdom.

The leader's associates are rough diamonds whose lustre needs the polishing of a skilled craftsman or craftswoman. In the process, he or she prophecies when they encourage people in ways such as these: "I think you could do this, if you tried." "I believe in you." Leaders realize that by adding a cup of encouragement, they may reap gallons of achievement.

## Leaders solve problems others fear.

"Those who try to do something and fail, are infinitely better than those who try to do nothing and succeed." (Lloyd Jones)

Leaders love challenges. While others may see challenges as stumbling blocks, leaders see them as stepping stones. To them, problems are unformed opportunities to create, to re-invent, and to excel. Like the football lineman who gets an adrenaline rush when the opposing player charges toward him, leaders are instantly motivated to stand against the problems they face.

Leaders view the overwhelming elements of a problem as an opportunity to marshal forces against it. Leaders are proactive. "Impossible" and "undoable" are words that are not usually on the lips of a true leader. They have a different language. "Yes". "I know we can." "We can do all things through Christ who strengthens us." "Let's try." Great leaders may be afraid at times, but they never allow their fears to keep them from facing a challenge with courage. When others are throwing in the towel, the leader is going back to the drawing board.

### Leaders are supportive.

"People cannot be managed. Inventories can be managed, but people must be lead." (H. Ross Perot)

A good leader looks out for the interests of others. They not only delight in the success of others; they actually create an environment that fosters it. Leaders are tireless motivators. As the leader diligently tends the crop, so the leader cultivates the team.

Leaders are quick to offer praise, personal advice, and words of support. They know the value of a positive note, e-mail, or telephone call. They understand one of the basic motivators: Recognition. They're quick to say, "*Thank you.*" "*I appreciate you*" flows naturally from their lips. They make their associates feel vital to the cause.

Unsuccessful leaders resort to blame, anger, and criticism in order to control people. Successful leaders set people free by supporting them. Leaders understand the importance of taking someone with them as they climb the ladder of success.
