wo years ago, (2016), the decision was taken to place some of the United Church business entities under the umbrella of one 'family, or holding company, now named the United Church Mission Enterprise (UCME).

The purpose was to manage the operations more efficiently, so that they would become income-generating and give necessary financial support to the Synod, which is responsible for funding the ministry and mission of the Church, inclusive of staffing costs for ministers and fulltime workers.

The operations of the entity, Chaired by President of the Victoria Mutual Building Society (VMBS), Mr. Courtney Campbell, is managed by CEO, Ms. Ingrid Chambers,

The prime entities of the UC-ME are the **Shirley Retreat Hotel**, located at 7. Maeven Ave; off Hope Road in Kingston; a hotel which embraces some 13 suites, and which is reputed for its delectable cuisine. The hotel, managed by Mrs. Shernett Smith, also offers accommodation for conferences and meetings, and has proven to be a popular choice for events such as its 'Mothers' Day' Lunch. Other events include 'Jamaica Night' planned for the last Friday of each month, and other celebrations such as "Fathers Day", and "Restaurant Week" have been identified as opportunities for a growing clientele for Shirley's to demonstrate its culinary skills in a cosy homestyle setting.

Meadowrest Memorial Gardens, uniquely a cemetery owned and operated by the United Church, recently marked 22 years of operation under the management of Mr. Leoroi Lorde, most recently succeeded by Mr. David Parkes, continues to build on its successes, currently holding the number two position after, Dovecot, among Jamaica's cemeteries.

Not satisfied to rest on its laurels, deemed Jamaica's most beautiful cemetery (see photo over-page), Meadowrest, will, within another month, be able to offer services such as above-ground inurnment, in its newly established Columbarium which is to be located as an annex to its centrally located Chapel.

Along with this new offer, clients will be able to access **Livestreaming Services**, as well as live videotaping, that will allow, among other options, the congregation to witness the **Inurnment Services** 'live' as part of the Thanksgiving Service for their loved ones.

Apart from the unique Grief Counselling services which it offers to mourning families, Meadowrest, through the collaboration of its sister company, Shirley Retreat, is now able to offer families the convenience of the preparation and service of the Repast meal, as well as providing on-site, a place for these repasts if so desired. A Memorial Wall, and Platinum Vaults are other innovative options being offered to build customer preference and loyalty!

It could therefore be said, that Meadowrest is Jamaica's only full-service Cemetery!

LEADERSHIP CORNER

'A UNION OF SORTS' SERMON BY REV. ANTHONY CHUNG, AT THE INDUCTION SERVICE FOR REV. NEVROY FRANCIS. t could be said the that authentic ministry was highlighted at the Induction Ceremony of Rev. Nevroy Francis, at which Rev. Anthony Chung, delivered the sermon, based on the text 2 Corinthians 4:1-12.

"An induction marks **a union of sorts**, a kind of marriage in which a minister and a congregation/charge make commitments to each other about what each believe God is calling them to do together", said Rev. Chung.

"Today, Portmore United and the Rev. Nevroy Francis along with his family are being joined in this union. They are being wedded together for the primary purpose of carrying out the ministry and mission of Christ for this congregation, in this place, at this time. Each of the parties in this union have had their own particular journey that has brought them to this commitment. It is the hope of all involved that this union will be fruitful and rewarding for all the parties, to the glory of God and the advancement of God's kingdom.

Today as we gather for this celebratory moment I invite our reflection around the text of scripture recorded in 2 Corinthians 4:1-12. Using that text as our guide we want consider this matter of **authentic Christian ministry in uncertain & troubled times.** We want to consider the question of what must constitute the essence of Christian ministry and witness, given the reality of the times in which we live. So, come with me on this journey. Let us see if together we can hear a word from God that will speak to us.

Speaking of the characteristics of what he termed '*Authentic Ministry*', **he advised**:

•We need to be **honest about the nature of ministry.** The text makes it clear that the ministry with which we are engaged is not our ministry, it is God's ministry. Since **by God's mercy**,

we have this ministry (v. 1). Serving in Christian ministry is a gift that God has given to us. It is not ours, as if we own it.

We also need to be honest about ourselves in ministry; self-awareness, being critical of one's self and being honest with ourselves promote a sense of humility. The truth is, we are weak creatures who are prone to error and failures. We all have our weaknesses and we must never forget that. Such honesty will save us from being judgemental and overly critical of others.

•We need to be honest about the perils of ministry (vv. 3-4)

There are many things that threaten our ability to be effective in ministry. It is a fool who would pretend otherwise. Some of these threats are external to us and some of them lie within us. In the text Paul talks about the "god of this age". The "god of this age" is our archenemy and the prime adversary of God's plan and God's people.

If we are going to be effective and authentic in ministry we must

understand that we are not simply wrestling flesh and blood. **Rather**, as **Ephesians 6 tell us**, we are in a spiritual battle and the fight is against principalities and powers, spiritual wickedness in high places. Authentic ministry is about helping the light of Christ to shine through.

•We must be honest about the purpose of ministry. This, I want to suggest speaks to our motivation in ministry. What are we called to do? and why do we do what we do? At our ordination, we made certain promises, through the ordination vows. We have been called to make disciples of Jesus Christ, to preach and teach, and care for God's people so that they can experience the transforming power of God and be reconciled to Christ.

•Finally, you need to be **honest in the practice of ministry.** My brothers and sisters how we conduct ourselves in ministry is crucial to any kind of success or impact we may have. In the text Paul talks about how he operated: **we have renounced the**

shameful things...we refuse to practice deceit...or to falsify God's word (v.2)

This is a statement of integrity; Paul wanted his ministry to be true to the character of Christ. We must never be associated with or known for any kind of bad behaviour or maleficence in our practice of ministry.

Honesty and integrity are not to be seen as optional extras reserved for the "super-spiritual" or "holy, holy". It is a non-negotiable for anyone who wishes to identify her/himself with the ministry of Jesus Christ. Honesty in our relationships with one another, honesty and integrity in doing our work, honesty and integrity in handling the financial affairs of the church. These are absolutely vital if we want to positively impact our world.

Authentic ministry in these troubled times require honesty and integrity! said Rev. Chung.
