Fruitful and Overflowing: International Girls' Brigade at 125 Years!

On Saturday, July 21, 2018, a ten-member Jamaican contingent gathered in Livingstone, Zambia, for the first day of the 12th International Conference of the Girls' Brigade (ICGB), held over an eight-day period. This delegation consisted of five (5) Officers, two (2) Youth Representatives, and three (3) Supporters.

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The quadrennial conference had as its theme: "Fruitful and Overflowing" based on the Brigade's call and charge to its membership to continuously bear fruits of the "true vine", and also because this year marks the Girls' Brigade's 125th anniversary.

With over 360 participants from 28 countries across five (5) Fellowships, the format of the Conference allowed for many opportunities to have inter-fellowship, and the sharing of ideas

Rev. Dennis Pethers of Rooftop International encouraged the gathering in **Fruitful Ministry**, emphasizing that a prerequisite for bearing fruit is remembering the enormous love of God towards us that enables us to change lives.

He reminded the group of Jesus' command to "Remain in Me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in Me. I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in Me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from Me you can do nothing" (John 15:4-5).

He asked and answered, "How do we become fruitful?" By allowing Jesus to transform us so that we become more like Him, and so live our lives among non -believers so that they question their unbelief. Within the context of the Girls' Brigade mission, he explained that being fruitful also means to be intentional in growing, developing, and moving into new countries and/or churches, for the establishment of new groups.

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convince them of the truth, show them love, and not be discouraged if the results of their seed-planting seem minimal.

The third key area explored was Pruning for Growth, led by Mrs. Brenda Muntemba-Sichilembe, Permanent Representative to the United Nations Office in Nairobi. The presentation surrounded the question of, "Who am I?" based on Mark 8:27, in which Jesus asked His disciples, "Who do people say I am?"

She asked the group, "What is the image that the Girls' Brigade has?" She suggested that they should be: Innovative-Do things in a new way to appeal to new girls; Masterful-Be a Master at what they do, and be a winner regardless of the circumstance; Authentic-As they change their approach, they should ensure that they remain true to their core beliefs; Go-Getters-Keep in mind their own track record, and dare to take on big challenges; Ethical-Maintain their standards, teach ethical standards while the girls are young, to enable them to grow into women with sound values.

The Jamaican delegation certainly packed in a full day of fun, visiting the Livingstone Museum (the largest and oldest in Zambia), and Victoria Falls (one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the World), and Mosi-oa-Tunya National Park.

Also critical to the Mission was Community Service, through a visit to the Paediatric, Maternity, and Female Wards of the Livingstone Central Hospital. This was done based on the Brigade's four-square programme of meeting the following needs: Spiritual, Physical, Educational, and Community Service.

The event culminated in a showcase of national costumes by representatives of all twenty-eight (28) member countries, who also had the opportunity to experience traditional Zambian culinary and musical culture, and the amazing total lunar eclipse!

The ICGB Conference was indeed, a wonderful opportunity for learning, sharing, and enrichment, and the Jamaican contingent returned refreshed and revitalized to continue their efforts to fulfil the vision of the Girls' Brigade: "Girls' lives transformed, God's world enriched."

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LEADERSHIP CORNER CHARACTER: An Indispensable Quality of a Leader

What makes people want to follow a leader? Why do people reluctantly comply with one leader, while passionately following another the full distance? What separates leadership theorists from successful leaders who lead effectively in the real world? The answer lies in the character qualities of the individual person.

Do you know whether you have what it takes to become a great leader, the kind who attracts people and makes things happen? That's a question each of us must have the courage to honestly ask—and answer—if we want to achieve our real potential and impact lives for the glory of God.

Let's examine an indispensable quality of a Leader. These pointers can help you to recognize, develop, and refine the personal characteristics needed to be a truly effective leader, the kind people *want* to follow.

CHARACTER: How a leader deals with the circumstances of life tells you many things about his or her character. By God's enablement and our yielding to His will, crisis can build character, and it certainly reveals it. Adversity is a crossroads that makes a person choose one or two paths: character or compromise. Every time we choose character, we become stronger, even if that choice brings negative circumstances. The development of our character is at the heart of our development, not just as leaders, but as human beings.

What should we know about Character?

Action is the real indicator of Character. Your character determines who you are. Who you are determines what you see. What you see determines what you do. That's why you can never separate a leader's character from his or her actions.

Talent is a gift, but Character is a

choice. There are some things that we don't have control over in life. We don't get to choose our parents. We don't select the location or circumstances of our birth and upbringing. We don't get to pick our talent or IQ. *But we do choose our Character.* In fact, we create it every time we make choices—to cop out or dig out of a hard situation, to bend the truth or stand under the weight of it, to take the easy money or pay the price.

Character brings lasting success with people. True leadership always involves other people. Followers do not trust leaders whose character they know to be flawed, and they will not continue following them.

Leaders cannot rise above the limitations of their character. Have you ever seen highly talented people suddenly fall apart when they achieved a certain level of success? The key to that phenomenon is *Character*. Author Steven Berglas says that people who achieve great heights but lack the bedrock character to sustain them through the stress, are headed for disaster. It is a terrible price to pay for weak character.

If you have found yourself being sucked in by this hindrance to fulsome living, remember that unaddressed cracks in character only get deeper and more destructive with time. Ask yourself whether your words and actions match-all the time. When you say you'll finish an assignment, do you always follow through? If you tell your children that you'll make it to their ball game or recital, are you there for it? Can people trust your handshake as they would a legal contract? As you lead others at home, at work, and in the community, recognize that your character is your most important asset.

To improve your character, do the following:

Prayerfully search for the cracks. Spend some time looking at the major areas of your life (marriage, family, work, service, etc.), and identify anywhere you might have cut corners, compromised, or let people down. Write down every instance you can recall from the past two (2) months.

With God's guidance, look for patterns. Examine the responses that you just wrote down. Is there a particular area where you have a weakness, or do you have a type of problem that keeps surfacing? Detectable patterns will help you diagnose character issues.

With God's courage and strength, face the music. The beginning of character repair comes when we face our flaws, apologize, and deal with the consequences of our actions.

By God's empowerment, rebuild. It's one thing to face up to your past actions. It's another to build a new future. Now that you've identified any areas of weakness, create a plan that will prevent you from making the same mistakes again.

Everything rises and falls on Leadership. Leaders are effective because of who they are on the inside—in the qualities that make them up as people. To fulfil our leadership potential, we have to develop these traits from the inside out. People will then want to follow us, and we will be able to have the desired impact on those around us.
