TIM Programme Reaps Holistic Development!

embarked on an overseas training mission that has enriched her with a fresh invaluable holistic development.

This year's Training in pro-Mission (TIM) gramme, sponsored by the Council for Word Mission (our partners in Mission), began with two (2) months' exposure to Auckland, New Zealand, continuing with another three (3) months in Suva, Fiji, and will end with two months of training Seoul, South Korea.

life-altering gramme is dual in its aspects. A primary component of the experience has been the biblically-based courses offered to the participants. These have included: "Engaging Church", "Encountering God", "Interrogating God", "Decolonizing Scriptures", "Indigenizing Church", and others.

On May 7, 2018, Ms. Her most impactful Mod-Mickesha Fearon of Lin- ules have been, "Situating coln Kirk United Church Mission" (Module 1) and Acclimatizing (Module 3).

Christian perspective and Module 1 brought into focus for her the harsh reality of the impact of slavery on her nation, Jamaica, birthing in her a new appreciation for her ancestors who



persevered despite the tremendous hardships experienced. Module 4 was based on Climate Change, an engaging and intriguing topic for her, which brought extended knowledge beyond the borders of Jamaica, and taught her that our carbon footprint affects not only humans, but all of God's creation.

Like the other Modules, the latter has empowered her to return to her community with what she has learnt. with equipped knowledge and willingness to change her lifestyle for the benefit of the Climate and creation.

Indeed, it has been an enlightening and faithbuilding experience for Mickesha. She has found that the concept of the Mission of Christ is understood very differently in each geographical context that she has visited. Her understanding of this Mission has broadened beyond prayer and the usual practises of evangelism. Mission, for her, now includes speaking with the people in the margins, instead of speaking to them.

She now believes that, beyond quoting scriptures, we are called to give power to the powerless and voice to the voiceless, and to speak out against injustice, whenever it is apparent.

TIM Programme Reaps Holistic Development!

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Even more than the contextual experience, the knowledge she has gained in her classes has influenced her perspective on Christianity. Prior to participating in the TIM programme, her view of Christianity was about being Christ-like and attaining spiritual growth only. While she recognizes that her spiritual growth is important, being a Christian now means thinking of the other person - "Ubuntu ngumntu ngabanye abantu" – meaning, "a person is a person through other people". She has also realized that the Mission is not only about us, but about creating an environment of peace, love, stability, and equality for the present generation and those to come.

While in New Zealand, Mickesha was placed at Solway Trust for exposure to Mission. This organization caters to intellectually-disabled persons, who have been ostracized by their families and communities.

During the TIM participants' visits to the Trust, they played games, karaoke, and puzzles with their new friends, who openly, and happily welcomed them. Despite their disabilities, they joined them in song, greeted them with warm hugs, and shared their stories with them.

Another placement was at SPLICE, which provides a variety of services to the com-

Mission - particularly that it can be done by the simple act of lovingly sharing space with someone who is vulnerable.

Even as she engages in the last leg of the programme, Mickesha has begun to think about the contribution that she will make to the UCJCI, Jamaica and the Cayman Islands on the whole, upon her return

She has begun to put together a concept note for an Environmental Stewardship project that she hopes to launch - one which is in line with the Church's focus on Renewal and Transformation, Jamaica's Vision 2030, and the World Council of Churches' Advocacy on Food for Life Campaign.

By way of this project, Mickesha aims to interrelate Climate Change with Theology, clean up three (3) local communities, create a space for young people to express themselves through art and poems on scriptures related to the environment, bridge the gap between the youths of Jamaica and the Cayman Islands, among other ventures.

While she misses her Jamaican food, and does not have the opportunity to speak with her family and friends as often as she normally would, she has gained family in her fellow TIM participants, and a tremendous amount of exposure to new culgood starting place for a life of mission!

LEADERSHIP CORNER

Generosity: An Indispensable Quality of a Leader

"Your candle loses nothing when it lights another." John C. Maxwell

Nothing speaks to others more loudly or serves them better than generosity from a leader. True generosity isn't an occasional event. It comes from the heart and permeates every aspect of a leader's life, touching his or her time, money, talents, and possessions. Effective leaders, the kind who people want to follow, don't gather things just for themselves; they also do so in order to give to others.

Here's how to cultivate the quality of generosity in your life:

Be grateful for whatever you have.

It's hard for a person to be generous when he or she is not satisfied with what they have. Generosity rises out of contentment, and that doesn't come with acquiring more. If you're not content with little, you won't be content with a lot. And if you're not generous with little, you won't suddenly change if you become wealthy.

Put people first. The measure of a leader is not the number of people

who serve him or her, but the number of people he or she serves. Generosity requires putting others first. If you can do that, giving becomes much easier.

Don't allow the desire for possessions to control you. More and more people are becoming enslaved to the desire to acquire. If you want to be in charge of your heart, don't allow possessions to take charge of you.

Regard money as a re-

source. Someone once said that when it comes to money, you can't win. If you focus on making it, you're materialistic. If you try to, but don't make any, you're a loser. If you make a lot and keep it, you're a miser. If you make it and spend it, you're a spendthrift. If you don't care about making any, you're unambitious. If you make a lot and still have it when you die, you're a fool—for trying to take it with you. The only way to really win with money is to hold it loosely and be generous with it to accomplish things of value.

Develop the habit of giving. The only way to maintain an attitude of generosity is to make it your habit to give—your time, attention, money, and resources. Richard Foster advises, "Just the very act of letting go of money, or some other treasure, does something within us. It destroys the demon greed." If you're enslaved by greed, you cannot lead.

Are you a generous leader? Do you continually look for ways to add value to others? Are you giving money to something greater than yourself?

To whom are you giving your time? Are you pouring your life into others? Are you helping those who cannot help you or give anything in return? If you aren't giving in the small areas of your life, you're probably not as generous a leader as you could be.

To improve your generosity, do the following:

Give something away. Find out what kind of hold your possessions have on you. Take something you truly value, think of someone you care about who could benefit from it, and give it to them.

Put your money to work. If you know someone with the vision to do something really great—something that will positively impact the lives of others—provide resources for him or her to accomplish it. Put your money to work for something that will outlive you.

Find someone to mentor. Once you reach a certain level in your leadership, the most valuable thing you have to give is yourself. Find some-

one to pour your life into. Then give him or her time and resources to become a better leader.

In the words of Indian poet Rabindranath Tagore, "All that is not given is lost." What are you currently losing by holding on to it? Giving is the highest level of living.


