

# **A SHOT IN THE ARM** *The Case for COVID-19 Vaccine for All*

Statement from The Church and Society Committee of The United Church in Jamaica and the Cayman Islands

he news that Jamaica, as one of the countries that is part of the Covid-19 Vaccines Global Access (COVAX) facility, is set to receive its first doses of the AstraZeneca vaccine this month is welcome relief. The Government has previously indicated that vaccines would not be available before April 2021, with a target of vaccinating 16% of the population by the end of 2021.

Given the widespread nature of COVID-19, its mutation and the exponential rise in cases in Jamaica over the last few weeks, the need for a vaccine is fundamental to bringing the virus under control. This would allow for a reduction in the infection rate and usher in a positive movement towards achieving herd immunity.



The Government has indicated that this vaccine will be made available to population the free of cost. However, due to the cost of the vaccine from the various suppliers, it is not beyond the realm of possibility to suggest that the government does not have the resources to make this available to sufficient numbers of the pop-

ulation at a pace and level to achieve herd immunity, which conservatively is around 90% of the population .

The Private Sector of Jamaica has indicated its willingness to purchase the vaccine and having their workers vaccinated. This would assist the effort to increase the number of those vaccinated. One would hope that there will be a public/private partnership in supplying vaccines to the wider population. Indeed, a healthy population makes for a more productive nation.



vaccinated in the shortest possible time in order to achieve herd immunity.

What seems likely, however, is that given the basic principle of supply and demand, there will come a time in the short to medium term where a cost is attached to obtaining the vaccine for persons who require it. The reasonable conclusion is that there will come a point where the vaccine will not be affordable to all within the society.

Consequently, for every Jamaican, the vaccine should be available, accessible and affordable.

Communities of believers have often come together to respond to pressing needs in society. From the Bible we learn, for example, how the church at Antioch (Acts 11 &12) responded to the famine needs of their sisters and brothers and established a relief fund which was sent to Jerusalem under the supervision of Paul and Barnabas. This is a fundamental principle of community, where there is a consensus principle of all being included and supported in a time of need.

One of our United Church congregations has taken this biblical principle and has applied it to the current COVID-19 vaccination need. They have established, as part of their budget for 2021, a fund to ensure that members of their congregation should be assisted to access the vaccine during this year. The commendable underlying principle is that no one should be left behind.

As we wrestle with the issues of justice and equity in this Black History Month, should we not offer this as a starting paradigm for our own United Church and the wider church, where such funds be established and hopefully, in partnership with local businesses and communities, expanded to include as many as possible to achieve the herd immunity so necessary at this time?

Should we not also advocate for a strong partnership between the private sector and the Government in the acquisition and distribution of the vaccine, where necessary at cost, making the vaccine as affordable to as many as possible in the shortest time possible?

In response to these questions, it is our hope and commitment, as the United Church, to work towards the reality of all who need a shot in the arm to manage and overcome this virus will receive it .

# Fasting in a Feasting Culture?

On this Ash Wednesday, as the Christian Church once again observes the beginning of Lent, a 40-day fast in preparation for Easter, we do so in emulation of Jesus' fasting in the wilderness before he began his public ministry. Fasting as defined by the Encyclopaedia Britannica is the "abstinence from food or drink or both for health, ritualistic, religious, or ethical purposes".

This practice of fasting is not a new one and has existed from antiquity. It has proven itself to be of great worth and value. Whilst fasting is not restricted to religion, it plays an essential

role in the life of the Christian Church.

But abstaining from food or drink or both in a culture of feasting? Is this still plausible? If we consider the various purposes for fasting, therein we may arrive at our answer.

Fasting has been known to avert or halt calamity by evoking God's compassion (1Kings 21:27-29). Fasting has been known for successfully averting disaster facing a community or a nation. When Jonah delivered God's message to the people and King of Nineveh, they received it and repented. The King called a fast in response to which they put on sackcloth and turned from their evil ways, or in the words of Jonah 3:10, "God

relented of the disaster that He had said He would do to them, and He did not do it". Fasting has been used to express repentance and a return to God (1Samuel 7:6). Fasting has been used in seeking deliverance and protection (2 Chronicles 20:3-4). Fasting has been known to spiritually strengthen participants (Matthew 6:16-18). Fasting has been declared a necessity for overcoming certain situations with which Jesus' disciples were faced (Matthew 17: 14-21). "However, this kind does not go out except by prayer and fasting", Jesus' own words.


Indeed, we live in a fast-moving world where most things are available at the click of our fingertips and we want what we want and we want it now. Jamaica is known worldwide for its culinary delights. Jamaicans in general take pride in our foods and we enjoy good food. Our people no doubt belong to a feasting culture. Nonetheless, I am convinced and convicted that the spiritual discipline of fasting is still very much relevant for those of us who are called to be disciples of Christ. with soul cleansing. It does this by giving us the opportunity to be rid of the toxins that would have built up in our bodies over time. Fasting continues to be relevant as it has the ability to increase our desire for God. Through fasting, we connect with God in ways that may not have been possible otherwise. Fasting continues to be relevant as it improves our ability to hear and recognize the voice of God. Fasting continues to be

relevant as through fasting we can request God for a shifting in what we really deserve.




