Rooting Our Spiritual Health in God Brings Us Hope

Please read Exodus 20:1-17/Psalm 19

It would seem *unimaginable* that *anyone* could have failed to have been awakened to the longstanding, unambiguously inequitable realities whose groans reached a deafening din during this pandemic.

Over 2.5 million *individual human beings* have *died*, and countless others have desperately, and literally, fought for breath, and otherwise suffered, from the physical, financial and emotional ravages of Covid-19. Therefore, it is shocking to see how easily so many, including some who should have been leading facilitators of the world's response, have refused to allow their eyes to be pried open even by human distress too enormous to be obscured. It is beyond incredulous that persons have still not acknowledged the desolation, barrenness of life, and hopelessness of so many, that has taken root in so much of this world which God created to be glorious, vibrant, life-giving, flowing with the milk and honey of opportunity, not for 'some', but for everyone. Clearly, when we become our own god, the call we hear is not to justice and mercy, because that requires humbleness.

Can a Christian really believe that the *freedom* God demanded for God's people meant God was championing *my personal freedom* to *refuse* to wear *a face mask*, a breathing filter made to help *protect my neighbour's* wellbeing? Really? And when Christ declared that the truth found by *holding to His teaching* will *set us free*, wasn't that free *to live as He lived*, *selflessly*?

If ever there was a time in the lifetimes of most of us living today to see the *truth* of what God sought *to implant anew* into the nature of the people God had *freed* from Pharaoh's oppression, before God would let them enter their new home, it has been during this pandemic. The *benefit* of *all that it takes* in order to *enjoy the freedom* to *love your neighbour as yourself* should now be glaringly obvious to us all. For example, surely if a Government has to close down sections of the economy for an extended period in order to protect the health *of all of us*, then isn't it only right that the rest of us *also share* the costs of that protection? So we all help foot the bill *for our* *health*, by enabling the Government to use *our* tax dollars to replace the income of those people whose jobs have had to be suspended, and to help them find different employment, etc.

Surely none of us would want to have *our own* source of income *and our* dignity being taken from us by the same act? And isn't that God's point about *loving my neighbour as myself*? In Cayman, we have been blessed during this time by the priority our Government gave to the sanctity of God-given life *and* a number of circumstances we were already blessed to be in. Nevertheless, it was clear *we* too had *not been providing equally just opportunities* for *everyone*, a basic component of that precept Jesus termed the second greatest commandment.

This has been even more glaring in other places. Who cannot have been shocked to see those long lines of hungry people forming in the richest country on earth? And *within mere days* of the pandemic being declared there, so quickly dependent on the kindness of strangers? Those types of *structural indifference, infections eating away our social and moral fabric*, so widespread around the world, were *made completely by humans*, weakening our natural resilience long before this virus made its move on us.

But we know that for the Christian, the measure of our faith and the level of our obedience to Christ is never limited to those particular sins that we individually find most obvious. So our greater concern must be, what am *I* failing to see, obey Christ in, and act on, in this time of a pandemic, as well as always?

In that regard, our Synod has led all of us in the United Church to *truly endeavour to embrace* the renewed *rejoicing*, and the *accompanying opportunity*, that life in Christ gloriously promotes, whatever our circumstances. Synod has expressed this as follows: "With a strident *conviction of faith in God* and a *determination* to be *faithful* to God's *call* to the church to make disciples, UCJCI *declares* we are: *Rooted, Resilient: Responding in H.O.P.E.* (Hope, Opportunities, Peace, and Evangelism.)"

As part of that, we have been looking at the necessity of *health*: physical, emotional, and starting now in March, *Spiritual Health*. And for today, we have been invited to reflect on, **"Rooting our Spiritual Health in God brings us hope".**

In this respect, I want to emphasize at the outset two core words, "*in God*". Many people acknowledge what they call, "feeling spiritual" but do not accept the *reality* of *Christ*, of *God*, or the *wholeness of God's precepts*. The invitation for us today is

to find *lasting, life-enhancing hope* by *rooting* our *spiritual health* firmly *in God*. In fact, the question that was posed for this Sunday's particular consideration firmly drives home that point: "How faithful are *we* to *God's commandments*?"

We read in the familiar words of today's main text, Exodus 20: 1 - 17, "*I am the Lord your God, who rescued you* from the land of Egypt, *the place of your slavery*. You *must not have any other god but me*. You *must not make for yourself an idol of any kind* ..." [NLT]

We know the other "must nots", *lying, stealing, murder, misusing God's name, adultery, envy,* and the two stated in the positive, to *keep the Sabbath day holy* and *to honour our parents.* We can never afford to let this Scripture grow dim in our minds, for let us make no mistake about it, in this life we are always *in*, or on the precipice *of, a place of slavery*, one step away from making for ourselves *an idol of some kind*, or, especially in the throes of some kind of success, from *becoming our own god*.

Clearly, the world has struggled for thousands of years, and to be honest, we all have, to at least some extent, for Spiritual Health, rooted in God, by faithfulness to God's commandments. Those precepts never change, as they ensue from God's essence of total love and constant righteousness. And they were not given in isolation as rules to be obeyed out of fear of the consequences of not doing so, as unbelievers still misconstrue them, or as many try to distort them in order to impugn the concept of faith in God. Instead, God sets prisoners and slaves free to be the people we had been made to be, when created by and in that complete love and righteousness. Psalm 19 shows us the beauty of God's precepts and of living in accord with them:

"7 The instructions of the Lord are perfect, reviving the soul. The decrees of the Lord are trustworthy, making wise the simple.

8 The commandments of the Lord are *right*, *bringing joy to the heart*. The commands of the Lord are *clear*, *giving insight for living*.

9 *Reverence for the Lord is pure, lasting forever.* The laws of the Lord are *true; each one is fair.*

10 They are more desirable than gold, even the finest gold. They are sweeter than honey, even honey dripping from the comb.

11 They are a warning to your servant, a great reward for those who obey them."

Christ confronted that persistent distortion around the precepts of God straight on, with His message that He came into the world not to destroy any of these but *so* they would be *fulfilled in Him*, so *we* could be *saved*. St. Paul spent a lot of time on this too, how *life in Christ*, total surrender to Christ as *Lord* of our *daily* lives, is the *only way* for us to live obedient to God, and thus restored to spiritual health.

I have found particularly helpful the simple account of a prisoner out on probation, who had been unable to get a job because of his record. He had come to feel he had no alternative but to go back to robbery, in order to subsist. One night he went into a church. Displayed there, were those Ten Commandments that had often been *quoted* to him. He went livid. 'Why are You always *ordering* me what I *must not do*, "Thou shalt not "do

this, "Thou shalt not" do that', he cried out to God, and anyone else listening. Then, it dawned on him, *God was not ordering him*, God was *reassuring* him, *you shall not do such things, because you do not have to.*" God is reassuring all of us of the same thing, that 'you were made for better living than that. And in my love, I have already made provision for you; trust in Christ to strengthen and guide you to never feel tempted by, or abandoned to resorting to, such things again.'

May our response to that love of God always help enable our neighbours to experience the fullness of that reassurance along with us, truly free from whatever would enslave us, rescued, rooted, and resilient in our home in Christ.

Savannah United Church Highlights





2021 World Day of Prayer Vanuatu

Press Release Build on a Strong Foundation



Women of the Republic of Vanuatu (located in the South Pacific Ocean) have prepared this year's service. The black and white sandy beaches, coral reefs with colored fishes, lovely birds, fruits and nuts in the forest, all make the islands a pristine environment but they are vulnerable to frequent tropical storms, earthquakes, cyclones, tsunamis and active volcanoes. Women, men and children of all ages are called to

'Build on a strong foundation' and live in unity, love and peace in the context of ethnic and cultural diversity like Vanuatu and so many other places around the world.

World Day of Prayer is an international, inter-church organization which enables us to hear the thoughts of women from all parts of the world; their hopes, concerns and prayers. The preparation for the day is vast. An international committee is based in New York and there are national committees in each participating country. Regional conferences meet to consider the service and then local groups make their plans. Finally, at a church near you on Friday 5 March 2021 people will gather to celebrate the service prepared by the women of Vanuatu.

The Day of Prayer is celebrated in over 170 countries. It begins in Samoa, and prayer in native languages travels throughout the world – through Asia, Africa, the Middle East, Europe and the Americas before finishing in American Samoa some 39 hours later.
