or 99 years, UCJCI has been providing shelter, protection, spiritual and physical nurture and socialization for children who are wards of the State. UCJCI operates two Children's Homes—the Mount Olivet Boys' Home in Manchester, and the Pringle Home for Girls in St. Mary.

Pringle Home for Girls is a grand lady of 99 years, established by Rev. and Mrs. James Mc Nee and their daughter Kathie. Money to construct the building was donated by the then Custos, Dr. John Pringle, hence the name of the Home.

Mount Olivet Boys' Home is of younger vintage at 54 years old and between both institutions 65 children are embraced in UCJCI's arms of ministry with children.

According to Jeanette Rose Bryan, Director, Pringle Home, "Sometimes families are unable to function effectively and sometimes the development of the children is affected negatively. When this happens, the Child Protection and Family Services Agency intervenes. There is a legal process through the courts that determines the outcome of each case. Our children come to us through this system as Children in Need of Care and Protection."

Touting the vision: To transform the lives of hurting children in a safe and secure family oriented environment, where faith in God is developed and hope is restored, the Director continued, "Children whose self esteem has been damaged need special nurturing. And so our children at the Pringle Home for Children are emotionally fragile. All aspects of their development become important in designing interventions. The special needs are many, but we could begin by ensuring that their physical environment is aesthetically pleasing; that the caregivers are committed to our mission to children by providing a stable family environment at the Home; that there is an adequate budget to provide not only basic but other necessary provisions."



In addition to the forty boys at Mount Olivet Boys' Home, there are 2 rented facilities which accommodate 8 youngsters. The rent is paid for the Transitional Living Programme (TLP) which is a unit of the Child Protection and Family Services Agency (CPFSA). All the youngsters in the rented facilities are in HEART training institutions, colleges and/or fulltime or part time employment. Patrick Newman, Director of Mount Olivet Boys' Home stated that, "There are 14 Desktop computers at the Home, 10 of which were donated by the Buju Banton Foundation recently."

He said, all the boys at the Home have tablets donated by the CPFSA and partners of the Home. The Mount Olivet Boys' Home has benefitted from the generosity of the Yohan Blake Foundation under the *YB Afraid initiative* to help children in need.

Pringle Home facilitates the holistic development of children through group and individual counselling, recreational activities, social skills training and educational opportunities. These interventions are facilitated through a clinical psychologist who visits the home weekly; attendance at Child Guidance Clinics; individuals and groups who visit the Home; and the staff at the Home.

The spiritual needs of the children are not neglected.


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Farm animals at Mount Olivet and Pringle Homes.

Rev. Donald Burke who is the Minister at the Carron Hall United Church is the Chaplain for Pringle Home. He has regular sessions with the girls. He has also organized the girls to participate in the worship experience at the church through the music ministry and also through the United Church Youth fellowship. Time is also set aside for morning and evening devotion in the Home.



Rev. Rohan Kong, Minister of the Mount Olivet charge of United Churches indicated that the boys are integrated into the life of the church through regular attendance at worship services prior to COVID-19 pandemic. He said, "They participate and use their gifts at special events such as harvest. They are involved in the church school of the congregation where they interact with other children and understand more about the Christian faith and the importance of serving God. From time to time, they would share their testimony of how God came through for them."

Rev. Kong said, members of the church contribute to their life and well-being by giving them encouragement and celebrating them on achievements. "As church, through the wider charge, we contribute financially to the home. Members would also donate to the home. In addition, the young adults, through the SRMC would give back especially through the birthday party initiative."

Both Homes make efforts to feed themselves through farming. Mount Olivet Home plants and sells cash crops such as cassava, cucumber and plantain. Income-earnings are also generated through rearing pigs, cows and goats. There is also



a greenhouse. At Pringle Home irish potatoes are grown as well as vegetable for the girls. At both homes, the children participate in the farm work in addition to employed farm hands.

WHAT HELP IS NEEDED?

PRINGLE HOME FOR GIRLS NEEDS:

- Volunteers for mentorship
- Assistance for girls in transitioning at age 18
- Financing e.g. to re-start chicken farm and egg production for sale
- Help to renovate the aging infrastructure
- Repairs to the solar electrical system

MOUNT OLIVET BOYS' HOME NEEDS:

- Caregivers
- Skilled staff to provide essential intervention—Social Worker, Counsellor
- **Psychological Services for boys and** staff

The 7th Sunday of Easter – also the last in the Season of Easter - is observed in Western Christianity as Ascension Sunday, by virtue of being closest to Ascension Day, the 40th day after Easter (Thursday, May 13 this week). While the major landmarks of Jesus' life (His birth, death, and resurrection) are very much present in the public consciousness, His ascension to heaven seems to hold less significance even among Christians, and maybe more so in our modern days. Nevertheless, there are plenty of references in the Scriptures emphasizing the importance of this event and its relevance for our faith. Jesus himself made several references to this during His ministry. Without attempting to provide an exhaustive discussion on this topic, let us consider a few key points that can guide our thoughts and maybe help us better appreciate why Jesus' ascension matters.

He is not here and yet He is here.

Following His resurrection, Jesus spent 40 days with His disciples while inhabiting a special 'resurrection body'. Although His body was not subject to the laws of nature, He 'confined' himself to a specific place and time. His Ascension and the subsequent outpouring of the Holy Spirit made Him accessible to one and all. Jesus is not here in His physical body anymore, yet he is here through the Holy Spirit. He said, "I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you." – John 15:8

His reign is real and yet it is to be actualized.

Jesus' ascension also signaled His enthronement at the right hand of the Father for His obedience, suffering, and death on the cross. "Therefore, God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." – Philippians 2:9-11 Nevertheless, His reign must be made real in our own lives day after day, and ultimately it will come to full circle upon His second coming at the end of times.

His ministry continues, both in Heaven and on **Earth.** Jesus' ministry has not finished with His death and resurrection but continues. On one hand, as our faithful High Priest, He represents us in God's presence, - "Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has ascended into heaven, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess." -Hebrews 4:14 On the other hand by the presence of the Holy Spirit He remains actively involved in and through the life and ministry of the Church Universal and the believers. - "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."- Acts 1:8 on Earth. 
