


A CASE FOR REPARATIONS



alls for reparation, or the making of amends for wrongs done to Caribbean Peoples especially of African descent but also to include other groups are being made around the world.

The voice of the Caribbean is present in these discussions. Recent statements by the United Kingdom High Commissioner to Jamaica, Asif Ahmad, have also heightened the need for more awareness and action among members of the Christian community to counter a narrative that reflects the perspective of the powerful.

Rev. Dr. Gordon Cowans, Chairman, UCJCI Reparations Task Force, reinforces the role of our church in this discourse and action.

"We may never know what Jesus said to Zacchaeus on that fateful day He visited him at his home. What we know is that the encounter changed Zacchaeus's life for all time. Zacchaeus voluntarily chose to take action towards restitution of an honest, generous relationship with his community.

Jesus said "Today salvation has come to this house" Luke 19 vs. 9. You and I and all the Church should live for the drawing near of the Kingdom of God into our experience.

Reparation for the grievous injustice perpetrated on generations of African people is a part of the process of reconciliation of human kind and the Church is invested in the ministry of reconciliation in the world."

One of the ways in which UCJCI is making its contribution to the demands for reparations is through the work of the **reparations task force**. These efforts have the following aims:

- To raise awareness on matters related to reparations within and widely beyond the walls of the UCJCI.
- To fulfil a Resolution of the 42nd Synod of the UCJCI which seeks to focus on the Caribbean call for Reparations.

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 To engage the participants in events which offer the opportunity to reflect upon the effects of our colonial past upon the present life experiences of our country region.

 To provide useful tools to strengthen our knowledge base on reparations and analytical tools.


The daily activities do not represent a simple harking back on the past but instead provides lens through which we may interrogate our past, present and future. Our journey of nation building is ongoing.

What are the aspirations for this awareness building? That through the Bible Studies, Conversations, Sermons and Lecture persons would take away and Biblical per-

UPDATED COVID PROTOCOLS

The Government of Jamaica, yesterday July 26, 2021, announced a number of amended provisions under the Disaster Risk Management Act. These provisions are for the period **July 27 to August 10, 2021.**

We wish to share with you the ones which will affect congregational life from July 27, 2021:


- Small Events (apart from worship) are allowed with no more than 100 persons in total or a maximum capacity of 50% of the usable square footage, whichever is lower. Please note that these events require approval from the relevant authorities in your parish.
- ◆ Curfew on Sundays begins at 3 p.m.
- Church services the number of persons allowed in the sanctuary will be 50% of the maximum capacity of the designated area for worship. This is to be calculated at 1 person per 40 square feet. (This number should be the half of what you used for your sanctuary prior to the last set of restrictions.)


Existing provisions remain in place as under:

- Funerals will be allowed with a maximum of 30 persons within the venue.
- Burials will be allowed for 30 minutes on weekdays from 9 am to 5 pm with a maximum of 30 persons at the graveside.
- Stay at home persons 60 years and over. Fully vaccinated persons are exempt.

Please note that the wearing of masks, hand sanitizing and social distancing are still required for public spaces and gatherings.

We invite you to comply with these provisions.





VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL AT EAST END – GUN BAY CHARGE





The East End and Gun Bay Charge held its Vacation Bible School (VBS) from July 14-16, from 8:30–12:30 pm under the theme "The Armor of God." On the first day, the children were divided into two teams named Nights of Canterbury and Nights of King Arthur, which were led by Jazial Martinez and Kelisha Sopeton, members of the East End Youth

Fellowship group.





Daily activities included worship, Bible lesson, crafts, and games. The Bible lessons focused on the stories of The Hebrew Boy, David and Goliath, and Paul and Silas. The preparation for VBS was aided by the

Savannah United Church that consisted of the Youth Worker Ms. Camille Watt, Mrs. Margaret Garcia and Ms. Annette Murphy. Over the three days, there were 16 children - 9 girls and 7 boys and over thirteen volunteers from the Charge and community. At the end of VBS every child left with a gift package.

total of 63 children ages ranging from 3 to 13yrs old attended five evenings of Vacation Bible School at the Savannah United Church from 4:30 pm to 8:00 pm. The Sanctuary, Hall. Boardroom, and Sunday School Classrooms were all decorated to reflect the theme Knights of the North Castle



Each evening started with registration in the Church Hall, then children were escorted to the Assembly area by Teen Leaders assigned as guides to each class. There were five classes in total: Kindergarten (8 children), Lower Elementary (10 children), Upper Elementary 1 (13 children), Upper Elementary 2 (17 children), and Middle School (15 children). Mrs. Kimia

Hemmings, Artistic Director, engaged the children in action songs reflecting the lesson for each day and an interactive puppet show with Sparky the Dragon played by Shantel Purnwasy. The lessons were then introduced with a video presentation and students were sent to their activity areas.

There were four main activity centers: Art & Science, Bible Story, Recreation, and Snack Art. To facilitate the large groups, the classes were scheduled to rotate every 30minutes to experience all the centers each day. Thirty- Two (32) adult volunteers and Nine (9) teen volunteers attended the VBS, but teachers were assigned once or twice for the week. Teens functioned as timekeepers and guides for the children when transitioning to activity groups.

The Bible lessons were centered on Bible Stories that demonstrated characteristics of Truth, Justice, Faith, Peace, and Salvation. The Three Hebrew Boys (Truth), David and Goliath (Justice), Jesus Walking on Water (Faith), Mary's Journey to Bethlehem (Peace), and Paul and Silas in Prison (Salvation). In addition to the stories, children were encouraged to be strong in the Lord (Ephesians 6:10) and to put on the whole Armour of God as we stand boldly for Christ. The children enjoyed the set, lively songs, puppet show, art sessions, bible lesson activities, and the creative snacks that reflected the theme and lessons for each day. On the last day, all the volunteers were presented with tokens of appreciation, a certificate and were celebrated with a themed cake.
