

Phoenix Rising! The International University of the Caribbean



"IUC faced the clear and present danger of not being viable as far as its debts were in relation to its income."

These were the words of Professor Roderick Hewitt, President of the International University of the Caribbean (IUC) in a recent interview.

However, the image of the legendary phoenix of Greek and Egyptian mythology, which symbolizes renewal and resurrection, came to mind as he described the current endeavours of the institution which is owned and operated by UCJCI. President and Board have been mandated to address the realities facing the institution and have taken a multi-pronged approach to tackle the challenges faced noting that success would not come by 'waving a magic wand'. A significant injection of funds would be necessary to address the historic debts. Instead eight strategies have been undertaken. They are as follows:

DEBT FORGIVENESS

Negotiate with creditors to reduce the level of debt.

RECALIBRATE NICHE

Recalibrate offerings to the academic marketplace in a number of ways. The goal is to identify the courses that people want tertiary institutions to address. This will involve reviewing the curriculum. A part of this approach will be re-engaging with the church (see information on page 4) The IUC leadership will speak with schools (UCJCI schools and others) to target students not quite ready for a degree programme to offer them a level of study which will prepare them for degree level study. They will also engage professionals seeking to upgrade themselves who struggle with costs to see how to negotiate making study accessible in a mutually beneficial way.

RETURN TO FOUNDING MISSION

This strategy involves finding a niche which allows the university to be true to its founding mission. The founding mission is to 'Seek peace and Pursue Excellence'. According to the



President, "IUC has sought to pursue academic excellence. The focus will be to more intentionally pursue the first part of the motto, 'Seek Peace', and this will involve developing the curriculum and planning through networking with national stakeholders." Targeting peace-building and violence prevention, IUC will train workers in non-governmental organizations and other areas to be facilitators of peace building in communities. Through the university, people who have already been working in peace building whose work is of a high quality may be accorded academic recognition.

RATIONALIZE STAFFING

It is important to operate with a staff component which is lean and suited for the tasks. "We will say goodbye to some persons and welcome new staff focusing on competence for the current marketplace."

RATIONALISE ASSETS

IUC will look at its current assets and seek to answer the question, how do we make the best use of assets. The high cost of rent in relation to student numbers will be studied e.g. Santa Cruz is one campus which is uneconomical. So students have been brought into another campus. Similarly Snow Hill has been closed. Even viable campuses will be scrutinized. Savanna-lamar is one such. The President noted, "With work having gone online it is not the best use of resources to continue to pay rent for that space, so a smaller space will be investigated."

COLLABORATIVE STRATEGY TO RAISE FUNDS

The goal is to seek third stream funding outside the local context. Professor Hewitt said, "Some earlier plans have had to be placed



on hold with the impact of COVID 19, however we are having discussions with the University of Kwazulu Natal in South Africa to

offer some PhD programmes. So this strategy involves collaborating in hosting courses and co-registering participants so the profits are shared accordingly."

PARTNERSHIP

IUC is exploring partnership with Kings College in London to develop its Peace Institute. The IUC Peace Institute and Extended Learning facility is an expression of the missional calling of the International University of the Caribbean. The Centre will aim to rise to the challenge of meeting one of Jamaica's greatest need at present that of contributing to the creating of a society less characterized by conflict and violence. Currently the university offers short courses in areas such as community leadership and accredited peace building modules. The goal is to offer a full programme in January in areas such as conflict resolution and peace-building, Adolescent Resiliency and



Well being will be offered in collaboration with Dr. Kim Scott Fisher from the Child Resiliency programme. This programme began in 2006 as an outreach programme of the Hope United Church, under the umbrella of the Hope Counseling and Wellness Centre. IUC will also be going to the marketplace—NGOS and other groups to encourage them to send their staff for training. These are likely to be 6-10 week programmes.

STRATEGIC BUSINESS PLAN

A strategic business plan is being developed which will be a turnaround document that impacts at every level of the university. The first draft has already been shared with the IUC Council. It is anticipated that by September the second draft will be ready. This will become the document for stakeholder buy in.

Greetings.

The earthquake, which had its epicenter near Haiti, on Saturday August 14, 2021, has been devastating for that nation. The severe physical, economic and social impact on Haiti have been made more challenging as shortly thereafter they experienced the passage of Tropical Storm Grace. All of this follows the recent assassination of their President.

The earthquake has caused much disruption in the lives of the people of Haiti, particularly in the Les Cayes Region. At the last count over 1,400 persons have lost their lives, and more than 6,900 persons have been injured. It is anticipated that these numbers will continue to rise. Additionally, there has been significant damage to, or the destruction of, homes and other buildings. Many persons are now homeless and desperate and the livelihood of others is severely threatened.

As part of our initial response as a church, we wish to offer financial support to the relief efforts in Haiti, through our established contacts there.

We are therefore requesting that your congregation/charge makes a contribution to this effort through a special offering over the next two Sundays August 22, and August 29, 2021. We are aware of the restrictions on attendance in worship in Jamaica and would suggest that, where possible, congregations make a contribution from their own funds.




OVER CI6,000 COLLECTED FOR ST. VINCENT AND THE GRENADINES

BACK TO CHURCH SUNDAY (BTCS), as an evangelistic outreach originated in the United Kingdom in 2004 focusing on inviting those who have been to church as casual visitors for a wedding, a baptism or funeral, or used to go to Sunday School. In 2009 it was 'reinvented' in the USA as a general evangelistic outreach and turned into an international movement. Since then it has spread worldwide, and with the participation of over 40,000 churches across 120 denominations in 90 countries, it reaches millions of people. As an annual evangelistic outreach event, it has been held in the CIRMC on the second Sunday of September since 2012. Leading up to that Sunday every active member in our congregations is expected to reach out to someone and invite them to the fellowship of believers, either as first-timers or returnees. To this end, we ask all of you to prayerfully and actively participate in this ministry.



Other work already done is the engagement of persons through Council for World Mission to be part of the staff of the university who will cover priority academic areas. Another is to work with Council for World Mission to advance its Legacy of Slavery objectives.

The President shared that other income earners include collaboration with the Canadian Immigration services and the Caymanian Immigration services to assist applicants for visas with training.

It is anticipated that with these eight strategies pursued with diligence, indeed UCJCI will witness the rising of the phoenix that is the International university of the Caribbean strengthened and determined to Seek Peace and Pursue excellence.


