UCJCI TRAINS LAY LEADERS FOR SERVICE

These are among the testimonies from participants in the 2021 UCJCI Lay Leaders Training Module 1. Training was held between February 13 and July 31, 2021 bringing together over 100 persons from across all regions of the United Church.

Covering 15 topics through lectures, discussions, PowerPoint presentations, group work, videos and role play, the training was delivered by lecturers drawn from the competent resource of United Church leaders; both ordained and lay.

There was some anxiety about whether the modality of online learning via Zoom would have adequately substituted for face to-face sessions. While some aspects of the learning were challenged by the online method of delivery, this did not diminish the quality of discussions and the competent delivery of training.

Spending the better part of six hours together in training proved a challenge, but heartiest congratulations to those who stayed the course (literally) and were diligent in participation.

Primarily aimed at those preparing to serve as elders in local congregations in keeping with the Synod's commitment to train lay persons for leadership, the lay training programme was re-designed in 2019 and standardized across councils in an effort to ensure quality control. The International University of the Caribbean (IUC) is the collaborating partner which provides the necessary quality assurance and certification of the programme.

Following the launch in November 2018, the newly named UCJCI Lay Leaders Certificate Course comprised three modules targeting different categories of lay leaders - elders are required to do Module 1, persons preparing to lead specialized ministries such as Pioneering Ministries, Youth and Children, are required to do Modules 1 and 2 and persons preparing to become Lay Pastors are required to do all three modules.

Any member of the church may choose to undertake training in the Lay Leaders Certificate Course and upon completion of all three modules may pursue further studies by matriculating for IUC's Diploma in Theology once they meet the requirements of Mathematics and English at the level of CSEC.

A grand Graduation celebration is planned for Sunday February 6, 2022 at 2 pm when the 2021 cohort of lay leaders will graduate. All are invited to tune in via UCJCI's YouTube channel. The 2022 round of Module 1 begins on Saturday February 12 and continues on second and fourth Saturdays between 9 and 2 pm and on Thursdays 6-8 pm in the week following the Saturday training days.



COVID-19 PROTOCOLS AFFECTING CONGREGATIONAL LIFE IN JAMAICA AND

THE CAYMAN ISLANDS

Cayman Islands

The number of COVID-19 cases in the Cayman Islands since the start of the pandemic is 11,666. As of this past weekend, more than 6,000 people in Cayman were in 2. isolation after testing positive for Covid-19. The Cayman Government has responded with regulations aimed at controlling the spread of the virus, including but not limited, to protocols for travel and gatherings. Consequently, indoor gatherings, including church services, are now restricted to 100 persons while outdoor gatherings are restricted to 250 persons.

Jamaica

There are 121,963 confirmed cases of which 11,814 are active with 2615 deaths. The Government of Jamaica said the amendments under the Disaster Risk Management Act (DRMA) will remain the same until February 11, 2022.

Please note and be guided by the following:

1.

the sanctuary for worship should be determined by the physical distancing requirement of a minimum of six feet between persons, but should not exceed 100 persons.

- Weddings the maximum number of persons allowed is 100.
- Funeral services are allowed with a maximum of 20 persons within the place of worship or facility.
- Burials are allowed for 30 minutes Mondays to Fridays between 9 am and 4 pm with a maximum of 20 persons at the graveside.

The other relevant provisions remain the same as under:

- 5. No physical crusades, conferences or conventions will be permitted.
- Physical gatherings are limited to 10 persons.
- Stay at home persons 60 years and over. Fully vaccinated persons are exempt.

Please note that the wearing of masks, hand sanitizing and Church Services - The number of persons allowed in social distancing are still required for public spaces and
