Sing A Song of Hope in God's Victory

Throughout the centuries, humanity has been wrought by disaster and conflict, including the threat of nuclear war, problems related to biological and chemical weapons, climate change, famine, monetary failure, overpopulation, asteroid strikes, and disease epidemics. The recent bout with the COVID-19 pandemic and the ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine are stark reminders of the unsettling moments of life's journey.

Periods of turbulence also attend us in our local communities, places of work, neighborhoods, schools, churches, families, and personal relationships.

As the Church, ecclesia, the called-out people of God, we are commissioned to comprehend the complexity of human life and proclaim the doctrine of salvation. The Book of Psalms is referenced as a description of the basic spiritual conduct, occasional movements, and thoughts of human life, where nothing to be found in this human life is omitted. Dietrich Bonhoeffer (Life Together, p. 44) posits that "nothing is wanting which relates to the knowledge of eternal salvation." The Psalter, Book of Songs, "might well be called a little Bible", as Martin Luther (Luther's Works, 35:254) describes it.

A postlude to the Old Testament and a prelude to the New Testament, the Book of Psalms is divided into five sections:

Book One; Psalms 1-41 – God is always with us Book Two: Psalms 42-72 – God goes before us Book Three: Psalms 43-89 – God is all around us Book Four: Psalms 90-106 – God is above us Book Five: Psalms 107-150 – God is among us

James L. Mays (1994) biblical scholar, postulates that the Psalms were originally composed for worship and thus the understanding of the same as psalmody, prayer, and praise from its introduction at Psalms 1 & 2 with concluding doxologies at Psalms (41; 72; 89; 106) and Psalm 150.

To sing a song of hope, today, we acknowledge the majesty and mercy of God through the hymn "My God, how wonderful thou art" (Frederick William Faber, 1848). This hymn has its origin in Psalm 113 and gives a call to praise in verses (1-3), a reminder of our chief service to praise God. Section verses (4-6) describe the exultation and incomparability of the Lord,

while verses (7-9) relate to the condescension and compassion of the Lord for the helpless, mirroring the change that occurs in human arrangements because of God's Mercy.

Psalm 130 has a remarkable history in the spiritual life of the church. The Latin De Profundis, English translation (Out of the Depths), points to the usefulness of all who find themselves in the dark and challenging places of life/existence. Luther refers to this psalm as "a proper master and doctor of Scripture," by which it teaches the basic truth of the gospel. John Wesley, Clergyman, Hymn Writer, and Evangelist who was a leader in the revival movement of the church in England, heard this Psalm sung on the afternoon before his transforming, 'heart felt strangely warm" experience at Aldersgate.

This psalm is a powerful expression of the scriptural theme: the human predicament and its dependence on divine grace. This Psalm has four parts intertwined by connecting elements.

Firstly, it mentions petitions to be heard in verses 1-2, followed by a statement about the relation in which sinful human beings stand to be forgiven by God in verses 3-4. A confession of faith takes the form of waiting in hope for the Lord in verses 5-6. This waiting is compared to watchmen for the morning, who acted as sentinels announcing the start of the day. At the conclusion, the psalm shifts from an address to the Lord to an exhortation to the religious community of hope for the Lord's redemption. These connections reflect a song with a theme of hope for forgiveness that the Lord will bestow by showing steadfast love in the redemption of Israel from all its iniquities.

Life is lived in danger and experiences of "depths" downing in distress, being overwhelmed and sucked down by "waters of trouble," but the psalm declares the certainty of a comprehensive and final redemption. The Lord has the authority and power to show "steadfast love" (hesed) in the work of redemption to liberate us from guilt and sin's effect on life to the eschatological reach, the ultimate hope of our salvation.

Many of our hymn writers like Fanny Crosby, William Cowper, Frances Havergal, Thomas Dorsey, Thomas Chisholm, and Horatio Spafford, among others, composed their songs from some of these places of distress, turbulence, and deep pain but found the inspiration to proclaim Songs of Hope in God's victory.

As we contend with the stringent issues of life and living in our world, we too, can find the inspiration, peace, and comfort in

scripture to pen and sing songs of hope. Hope stirs within us the deep assurance that God is faithful and has promised to be with us in life and in eternity.

100th Sanctuary Anniversary Celebrations at Elmslie Memorial United Church 1922 - 2022

The year-long celebrations of the 100th Anniversary of the construction of the Elmslie Memorial United Church Sanctuary culminated on the last weekend of October 2022, with a special Anniversary Gala held Saturday evening at the Lion's Community Centre and an Anniversary Service on Sunday, in the Sanctuary, at 4:00 pm.

His Excellency Mr. Martyn Roper, Governor; the Honorable Mr. Wayne Panton, Premier; Church Leaders and Government Officials paid tribute to those who were instrumental in erecting the very first cement block building in 1922 on Cayman soil. They also paid tribute to the generations of faithful believers whose Christian witness and service made the Elmslie Sanctuary a beacon of hope and strength throughout the years. Situated in the heart of George Town, the Congregation continues to play a pivotal role in the spiritual life of the local community with its many events and activities.



Keynote speaker of the Gala, Rev. Norbert Stephens (General Secretary-UCJCI), emphasized that the 100th Anniversary is part of the celebration of the pilgrimage of the Congregation that began in 1846 when Rev. James Elmslie set foot on the Cayman Islands. Such a pilgrimage cannot be undertaken without being rooted in an understanding of three facets of Christianity: faith, service, and leadership. These three represent the common thread woven into the fabric of one hundred years of ministry and mission in the current Sanctuary. Faith, service, and leadership represent a perpetual legacy that was bequeathed to the members of the Congregation. Hopefully, they will leave the same legacy to the next generation following in their footsteps.

Guest preacher of the Anniversary Service on Sunday, October 30, 2022, the Rt. Rev. Gary Harriott, Moderator of the UCJCI pointed out that even as we celebrate the quality work of the builders erecting a sanctuary that stood the test of time for one hundred years, the greater significance and the challenge is

what this Sanctuary represents. The current generations are called to ensure that this Sanctuary continues to symbolize and represent God's presence, where people can encounter Jesus Christ, the hope of salvation, healing, and reconciliation.

The CIRMC extends heartfelt congratulations to the Congregation, its leadership and its members and prays for God's continuing blessing on their witness and ministry.




